Having considered the importance of rule of law for the international community, the United Nations approved the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1984, which recognizes the equality, dignity, and rights of all global citizens,

Recalling the World Summit in 2005, the countries agreed that rule of law is necessary for the UN to accomplish its three goals,

Taking into account the fairness of the rule of law, the General Assembly in 2012 agreed that all people companies and institutions (including government) should have equal protection under the rule of law.

Noting with satisfaction the past efforts of various relevant UN bodies and non-governmental organizations,

Stressing the fact that UN faces significant obstacles and is in need of reform, particularly in the Rule of Law.

- 1. Calls upon for education for children about values and the importance of the Rule of Law;
- 2. Emphasizes the need to create a UN office against corruption;
- 3. Encourages countries to do more than just write down laws;
- 4. Requests supervision in institutions of government;
- 5. Expresses its hope for human rights for every race, religion, and gender;
- 6. Recommends better solutions to propel better cooperation among the Sixth Committee (Legal), the International Court of Justice, and the International Criminal Court.
