

Researching and Writing Position Papers

Position Paper Purpose

The **summary** a delegate writes following months of research, and then uses in the role of ambassador to **negotiate world affairs** at an international conference.

Three Main Points that the Bureau Looks For:

Ambassadors and Country Represented

Always speak or write about one's country in the most **positive** way possible.

NEVER criticize the policies of a country; instead, point out how improvements are being made to a current problem

Find out as much as possible about any "bad press" there may be regarding an issue and one's country to be able to discuss remedies or explain policies to fellow ambassadors.



What Questions Can a Teacher Ask to Support the Position Paper Process?

- **I.** Where to find more resources? How to dig deeper?
- 2. How do past actions help influence possible solutions?
 - 3. What do good solutions look like?
 - 4. How many resources are enough?

Common Issues and Solutions!





COMMON ISSUES

Not enough research — The delegate doesn't feel confident enough or able yet to begin the paper

Have the delegate write all facts and figures down, and then organize them

 Too much country background info and not enough topic info from their country's current position Be sure not to "get lost" in the history of the country and forget about the problem

Perspective problems

Look for global solutions, not just ones that are country focused

4. Solutions are not evident

Help the delegate clearly state each solution

5. Solutions may be vague or conflict with the current government's position

Review resources and highlight supporting evidence

6. Both Delegates in a committee need to know and understand both topics

Each delegate is responsible for participating in the writing and research for both topics in order to debate and negotiate with fellow ambassadors

7. There is no resource page or the delegate didn't include enough resources

Research, research, research. Ask any adults in your community to help research the topics and country information

8. Too short or too long

Ask your ambassadors: Will you be able to negotiate on behalf of the country on this topic? If not, more research is needed!



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
